Student thanks donors for award of Margaret Thomas Scholarship

A BA Psychology student, Paige Frankson, has written to the Trustees to thank the Trust and its donors for their support after she was given the Margaret Thomas Scholarship for 2011.

"Receiving this award means a great deal to me as it greatly eases my family's financial burden and is a good reminder that hard work has its rewards," says Paige.

She is in her second year of study and has done very well in her midyear exams. Paige, 19, hopes to go on to post-graduate study, specialising in clinical, biological or cognitive psychology. She says: "I have always been interested in psychology, especially in the mental processes that influence human behaviour and the extent to which groups and individuals influence our social and personal identities."

Girls give 'wizard' performance for South Africa House guests

The Durban Girls' College Choir and Orchestra managed to circumvent Harry Potter mania on London's Trafalgar Square to stage a wellreceived concert at South Africa House in aid of the Trust.

About 100 people attended the event in July, the highlight of a



fortnight-long tour by the girls to the UK and Ireland. But performers and guests were unable to get into South Africa House via the main entrance because of the crush of Potter fans outside and had to find their way in through a side entrance. The girls – many of them Potter fans themselves – were given a wonderful although brief grandstand view of the wizardry going on in the Square from an upper window before they had to go on to prepare for their concert.

The choir and orchestra performed a varied programme over an hour, including a unique "collage" of traditional African song and dance. Some numbers required audience participation, including waving the arms and ululating, or joining in beside the piano to sing with the choir. The guests took part enthusiastically. The choir was conducted by Ronel Perks, the orchestra by Ted Brien and piano accompaniment was by Kim Siedle.

Students tell of challenges, hopes and ambitions

The Trustees hear many stories of hardship among students at UKZN, underlining the vital difference that Trust bursaries can make.

For example, one student says both his parents died before he was two, he never knew his siblings, who have also died, and that the relation who has taken care of him is a domestic worker who is currently unemployed. "This is just half the things," he says, thanking the Trust for giving him the chance to shine through its support.

Another, explaining her motivation for studying to become a social worker, says: "I don't want other children to experience what I've experienced, coming from a rural area with no social workers and a high number of orphans with no shelter or food to eat."

Against such backgrounds, the Trustees have been impressed by the students' determination to succeed in their studies. Here is a sample of comments from some of the 13 students being assisted this year, apart from the two already mentioned above:

Zethembe Mseleku, 19, says he chose to study for a Bachelor's degree in Community Development as he is "the product of a disadvantaged community" and he wants to contribute to development and the improvement of people's standards of living. He says he most enjoys working with people and wants to give something back to his community.





Merusha Naidoo, 20, studying for a Bachelor of Social Science degree, says she enjoys interacting with people from all walks of life and would like to pursue a career in Marketing. She says in a letter to the Trust: "Thank you for bringing me a step closer to my goal and for motivating me to work harder in getting there. "

Nombulelo Mngadi, 19, is studying for a Bachelor of Social Work degree because she believes social workers can help deprived people to achieve a brighter future. She says: "Making a difference in one [person's] life can change a community as a whole."

Nombulelo wants to work with children, particularly those who are orphans, HIV+, suffering from TB or disabled. "My personal goals are to motivate, understand, cherish and give skills to the future generation," she declares.
