Trust calls for support in face of financial squeeze



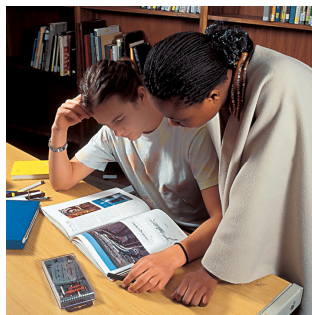
Your help is needed now more than ever. That is the message from the UKZN UK Trust to alumni and supporters in the UK as a result of a decline in donations to the charity in recent years.

The Trust has had to contend with the same problems faced by many charities in tough economic times when people have found it harder to give. But in addition the Trust has specific challenges, for example in reaching and eliciting support from alumni who have arrived more recently in the UK.

The Trust's story has been one of success since it was established 22 years ago. It has helped hundreds of needy students in that time. But, after years of supporting more and more students, the number has fallen by one every year for the past few years.

In 2012 it was 13, in 2013 it was 12. It is now likely to fall to 11 or even 10 in 2014 – unless you come to the aid of the Trust and give as generously as you can.

The need remains very great, with many students unable to find funding support.



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E-mail appeal fails to deliver

The Trust used bulk e-mailing for its Summer 2013 newsletter in a bid to save costs, especially given the steep rise in the price of stamps. Unfortunately this was not a great success.



Some 400 newsletters and forms still had to be posted to alumni for whom we had no e-mail address. About 35 e-mail addresses were incorrect and the e-mail bounced back, but in addition about 200 could not be delivered. Most of these involved company or Google addresses where we believe the e-mail was blocked by spam filters.

Therefore we urge anyone who did not receive the Trust's e-mailed newsletter in July to confirm their e-mail address and/or ensure that the Trust's e-mail address – info@ukznuktrust.org – is in their online address book so that the Trust's e-mails will not be blocked.

However, the response to the July appeal for donations was very poor – about half that following the previous mailing by post. A key point is that **no donations** were received in response to the Trust's e-mail. The money that was received came in with forms that had been posted out.



As a result, the Trustees have taken the difficult decision to post out the latest newsletter and donation form, despite the cost. There is a great deal of anecdotal evidence about the ineffectiveness of bulk e-mails, given the volume that many people receive.

The Trust may well use e-mail again in the future (perhaps once or twice a year), but it is likely we will have to bear the costs of a mailshot by post at least once a year to ensure effective communication with alumni and supporters.
